While he was on the bus, he dropped his phone and lost all his contacts. Noah hasn't got a lot of money, so he can't afford to buy a new phone.



8B Second and third conditional

Aims: To review and practise the second and third conditional.

Time: 10–15 minutes

Materials: 1 handout for each student

Exercise 1

- Give each student a handout and ask them to do the exercise. They should match sentence halves to make second and third conditional sentences. Remind them, if necessary, of the structures for second conditional (*if* + past simple, *would* + base form) and for third conditional (*if* + past perfect, *would have* + past participle). Students can then compare their answers in pairs.
- Check answers with the class.

Exercise 2

- Students read the sentences and then write second or third conditional sentences based on that information. Go through the first sentence with the class pointing out the changes in tense, word order and also the changes from negative to affirmative forms. Students then continue to work individually or in pairs.
- Check answers with the class.

Exercise 3

• Ask a volunteer to read the story aloud. Point out that students should be able to make three second conditional sentences and four third conditional sentences from the information in the text. Look at the second sentence: *Sam isn't very reliable and so Noah often gets angry with him*, and elicit a second conditional sentence from this information. Students can then continue to work in pairs.

KEY

If Sam were more reliable, Noah wouldn't get angry with him so often.

If Sam hadn't been late, Noah wouldn't have gone home.

If Noah didn't do a lot of cycling, he wouldn't be so fit. If his bike hadn't been broken, he wouldn't have taken the bus.

If he hadn't been on the bus, he wouldn't have dropped his phone.

If he hadn't dropped his phone, he wouldn't have lost all his contacts.

If he had some / a lot of / more money, he could afford to buy a new phone.
