

 - 1 noun + noun (bathroom, safety barrier)
 - 2 -ing form + noun (dining room, recording studio)
 - 3 adjective + noun (wet room, whiteboard)
- **b** We usually write compound nouns as two words, but sometimes as one word (*whiteboard*) or with a hyphen (*make-up*). Check in a dictionary.
- c The stress is usually on the first word.


